**Electronics:** Computers, TV's, Cameras, Telephones, Microwave Ovens, Game Systems, Printers, VCR's, Radios (items that contain hazardous materials) **<u>FREE</u>** 

Appliances: Refrigerators, Humidifiers, Dehumidifiers, Air Conditioners, Freezers, Stoves, Disposals, Lawnmowers, Electric or Gas Motors, Anything Steel <u>FREE</u>. NO DISHWASHERS, WATER SOFTENERS, OR FIBERGLASS TANKS!

**Tires:** will be taken at this HHW event. When scheduling your reservation, please state the number of tires being dropped off. Tires must be off rims and debris free. Measurements must be no larger than 1' wide x 4' high.

**Mattresses:** will be taken with this HHW event. When scheduling your reservation, please state the number of mattresses and box springs being dropped off. Fee: \$15 per mattress; \$15 per box spring

Many products you use in your home and yard contain hazardous materials. Improper disposal of these products can cause fires, injuries to people and animals, and groundwater contamination. This guide will help you identify hazardous products in your home. Keep your home safe by disposing of hazardous products properly.

- Key: Take to a hazardous waste collection site + Return to suppliers in your community
  - Pour down the drain (if connected to a sanitary sewer)

#### A hazardous product has at least one of the

following properties:

#### Toxic

Poisonous or causes long-term illness (such as cancer). Pesticides, paint thinners, many auto products and some cleaners are toxic. Look for words on the product label like:

"Harmful or fatal if swallowed"
"Use only in a well-ventilated area" (this means product fumes are toxic)

#### Flammable

Burns easily. Paint, thinners and other solvents, and auto products are the most flammable home products. Look for words on the product label like:

- "Do not use near heat or flame"
- "Combustible""Do not smoke while using this product"

#### Corrosive

Eats through materials (acid, for example). Oven cleaners, drain cleaners, toilet bowl cleaners and auto batteries are common corrosive products. Look for words on the product label like:

- "Causes severe burns on contact"
- "Can burn eyes, skin, and throat"

#### Reactive

Can spontaneously ignite or create poisonous vapors when mixed with other products (NEVER mix household products), or can explode when exposed to heat, air, water or shock. Fortunately, there are few consumer products still on the market that are explosive (except for fireworks). Some older explosive products might still be stored in homes. NW Cleansweep does not accept explosives of any kindcontact your local Sheriff's Office.

#### Don'ts

- > Do not DUMP leftover products in the backyard, woods
- or down the storm sewer.
- Do not BURN leftover products.
   Do not BURY leftover products.
- Do not REUSE pesticide or other chemical containers
- for other purposes.
- Do not MIX chemical wastes.
